Plant Heritage aims to conserve the diversity of our garden plants

We are the only national charity to ensure the cultivated plants we grow now will be available to future generations for cultural, medical, culinary and aesthetic use. We do this through the National Plant Collection scheme, our Plant Guardians and our local group network, supported by our threatened plants programme and Persephone, our online plant recording system.

What is a National Plant Collection?

Put simply, a National Plant Collection is a registered and documented collection of a group of plants. These can be linked botanically by plant group, or perhaps have a shared history or geography. They are held by Collection Holders across the country.

Did you know you can visit individual plant collections?

National Plant Collections are made available for people to view, either by appointment, on special open days or as part of a garden open to the public.

In Suffolk, you will find the full range of collections detailed in this leaflet. If you would like to visit a particular collection, you can make contact with a Collection Holder by using the details supplied.



Armeria Known as sea thrift of thrift Arbutus Small trees or shrubs with red berries Argyranthemum Large daisy-shaped flowers Campanula Blue, white, pink or purple bellflowers Caryopteris Fluffy blue-purple flowers Clethra Also known as Summersweet **Erysimum Commonly known as wallflowers** Festuca Low-growing grasses Gaillardia Known as Blanket Flowers Ligularia Herbaceous perennials with daisy flowers Lysmachia Related to Primula and Lythrum Paeonia (tree and species) Shrubs with woody stems Pittosporum Evergreen shrubs and small trees Potentilla (herbaceous) A huge but recognisable genus Silene Campion and catchfly, attractive to pollinators Troillus Globe flower, related to Ranunculus Verbascum Distinctive, popular herbacious


